
Students really enjoyed how the bush camp organised a fun colour war with three groups war-
ring against each other.






Future Footprints Student Council is an avenue for students to come together with representatives for all participating schools. It is a forum for students to have a voice, discuss issues and share stories and build networks.

Madalah Ball





Black & White Social 2017






Christ Church Grammar School students in their Indigenous designed jumpers




Guildford Grammar School students with their Indigenous round football jumpers


Career Expo 2017

Future Footprints has been coordinating the Career Expo for nine years. This year it was decided to reinvigorate the Expo by relocating to another host University. Curtin University put their hand up to host the 2017 Future Footprints Indigenous careers Expo. The University Stadium proved an excellent venue for the Expo. With over 30 stalls ranging from government departments to large corporate companies who offer traineeships, and cadetships to school based training there was a lot of information for school leavers. Students received a very warm welcome from Curtin University Elder-in-Residence Professor Simon Forrest and the Vice Chancellor Professor Deborah Terry.

The West Coast Eagles have always been very supportive of the Career expo and once again attended. Josh Hill was one of three excellent speakers who spoke of their educational journeys. Isaiah Attkins is a medical student at Curtin University and shared his inspirational story of how he decided to study medicine. St Brigid's College student Eleisha Ozies, now a graduate at Woodside, told students of her study at UWA and graduating and now in the workforce.




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Michael Spratt graduated from Wesley College in 2014 after spending 5 years as a boarding student. During his final year he worked under the guidance of art teacher Yvonne Weise to create a series of beautiful coolamons made of glass. Michael's art was immediately recognised as something of a very high standard and something very desirable. Michael had the idea to teach the younger students how to make them afterschool. He showed them how to tell their own stories using glass. Once students started making the coolamons teachers at the College wanted to buy them as they identified them as uniquely Australian gifts. Before long news had spread about the coolamons and people were ringing up inquiring how they could purchase one. Soon Wesley College began selling them in local art galleries and shops. Today the coolamons have travelled around the world, to Italy and the USA, Malaysia and China. On retirement from the position of Editor at the Australian Newspaper, Clive Mathieson was presented with a Coolamon, a gift in recognition of his support of a Wesley College scholarship provider. Coolamons are now displayed in houses and offices of diplomats, academics and friends and family of Wesley College, helping to tell the stories of Indigenous students fulfilling their dreams and telling their stories.






Pictured are some of the glass coolamons and made by the Wesley College students




Student Councillors

Prince Alfred College visit


Recently we had an interstate visitor from South Australia.






Sorry Day
